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Scotland's Drugs Early Warning System

Together We Can: voices are stronger, louder, and the most impactful when brought together.



The 31st August marks international Overdose Awareness Day the world's largest annual campaign to end overdose. Together we can learn how to respond to an overdose, spread prevention messages across communities, reduce stigma, remember our missed loved ones and make change.

All drugs, including alcohol and pharmaceutical medications, can cause an overdose and it happens when a person has more of a drug, or a combination of drugs, than their body can manage.

The current drug market is even more unstable than in previous years with the introduction of a range of new drugs including synthetic opioids, and an increasing range of benzodiazepines and other drugs, as well as changing patterns of drug use. In 2023, there were 355 drug related deaths across Greater Glasgow and Clyde (NHS GG&C), an increase of 18.3% on 2022. Whilst this number is still large it should be noted that similar to Scotland this is the second lowest number recorded since 2017. The highest number of deaths were recorded for those living in the most deprived communities of NHS GG&C (68.6% in SIMD Quintile 1). The full report for Scotland can be accessed via the NRS website.

Carry Naloxone

Naloxone

Naloxone is a drug that can reverse the effects of opioid drugs like heroin, methadone, opium, codeine, morphine and buprenorphine. It is only effective for opioid overdoses and won't work with any other drug. Although naloxone works on opioids, as most drug related deaths involve poly drug use, the use of naloxone will do no harm and may increase the chances of survival until medical help can be sourced. Naloxone kits are available to anyone who may be supporting someone at risk or likely to witness an overdose. Naloxone can come as either Prenoxad, which is a pre-filled syringe or as Nyxoid, which is a nasal spray.



This short e-learning course will show you how to administer Naloxone. You will learn facts about drug-related deaths in Scotland, how to identify a and respond to an overdose.



Scottish Families provide a 'Click & Deliver' takehome naloxone service to anyone living in Scotland who is over the age of 16 (for injection kit) and 14 (for nasal kit).

Every pharmacy in Scotland also has Naloxone available for use in an emergency either within the premises or for anyone overdosing near the premises. The pharmacy can administer the Naloxone or provide the kit to a member of the public who has had training in Naloxone and allow them to administer.
