

Message from Jane Grant, Chief Executive (21 April 2023, 10.15am)

Staff may be aware that the Scottish Government has announced the launch of a new community glaucoma service this week. I am really pleased to share with staff that NHSGGC is the first Health Board in Scotland to offer this new 'flagship eye care service', which will be rolled out to the rest of Scotland over the next two years. The new service will enable patients to be cared for at their local community optometry practice instead of in hospital, which brings with it real benefits to our patients and reduces the number of people visiting acute sites to receive care. I would like to thank our Ophthalmology, Community Optometrist and PC Support teams who have collectively been involved in developing the service. Your hard work will, I am sure, bring enormous benefits to our patients and wider optometry services.

I was delighted to receive a letter from Scotland's Chief Medical Officer, Professor Sir Gregor Smith, this week, praising the work of our Chronic Pain team. His letter notes the work the team has undertaken to redesign their service, which has resulted in a significant reduction in waiting times for patients. In his letter, Professor Smith said; "I would like you to pass on my personal appreciation of the willingness of the NHSGGC Chronic Pain team to adapt to meet the needs of their patients, providing care that they really value. While they have clearly taken the initiative to innovate and improve, I am genuinely delighted that Realistic Medicine principles and approaches have helped ensure people receive appropriate care, when they need it most. I am delighted that our NHS has the strong clinical leadership of the NHSGGC Chronic Pain team at this crucial time." I would like to add my thanks to the team for your collective commitment to service improvement. The progress you have made has been exceptional.
