The new facility will help ensure the service can grow to meet further demand while future-proofing the dispensary with new technologies to continue supporting our services. My thanks to the Property and Capital Planning team for their hard work in progressing proposals to this stage, and I look forward to the completion of the new facility.

This week marks Occupational Therapy (OT) Week, and I'd like to take a moment to thank all our OTs across NHSGGC for the incredible work you do with our patients. OTs play a crucial role in helping thousands of patients every year to do the things they want and need in their daily lives while managing health issues.
