North Sector SAB Group Update:



The North Sector SAB group have been focussing on ED/AAU improvement work regarding the use of VAD and if they are always necessary. The ED Practice Development Nurse will be reviewing the ED/AAU current process and improvement plan, with a view to providing further updates at the North Sector SAB group and to share associated learning.

South Sector SAB Group Update:



The South sector SAB group is now approaching 6 months of running. An action plan has included inviting areas of higher SAB numbers to discuss their actions and processes with the SAB working group to support shared learning and oversight. Education on SAB's and dealing with indwelling devices is being increased including dates with lunch and learn, medical education on induction and patient education.

As part of what matters to me, patients are being asked what information/ form of information they would like on any indwelling devices and local PVC audits are being developed.

Renal SAB Group Update:



The local Renal SAB group targeted the improvement and development of patient and staff education in relation to the care of Tunnelled central venous catheters, TCVCs used for haemodialysis treatment.

The group completed the following;

- Updated the patient TCVC information leaflet to include a section on "Caring for your line".
- Reviewed and updated the practice in relation to cleaning of line hubs and developed the "Scrub the Hub" campaign that ICPT have now adapted for wider use. MI Order Number -345571 v1.0.
- In collaboration with two patients, created a patient education poster that is now available to order via MI and is widely shared within the RDU and inpatient areas. MI Order Number 350779.
- Provided the above information for the renal patient APP which is due to go live shortly "Via the appropriate app store for your device, please search for "Right Decisions: Health & Care", then look for 'Glasgow Kidney Unit'"
- Introduced TEGO connectors for use within all GGC renal areas, whilst these are impregnated
 with an anti-microbial barrier to protect the line from contamination, the primary reason for
 our introduction was to act as a bridge between the bloodline and TCVC in order to prevent
 damage to the patient's access

Going forward, the aim is to complete a series of patient education videos covering information about the TCVC insertion procedure, long term catheter care and recognising signs of infection.

The WMTY Day provides a time to celebrate the conversations we have had and the positive outcomes for the people we care for and their families, which the Infection Prevention and Control Team (IPCT) were involved in.

The Acute focus was on PVCs and if patients were given verbal or written information at time of insertion.

The Mental Health focus – linking in with "Gloves Off" campaign and reviewing staff knowledge.

The information gathered will be taken forward by informing improvement actions and continuing to develop patient information.
